New Dates: 16-19 September 2021

The 4th Annual Virginia National Guard Management Group Conference originally scheduled for April 22-25, 2021 has been rescheduled to **Sept. 16-19**, **2021**. The conference will be held at the same location, the **Norfolk Waterside Marriott Hotel** and Convention Center.

The Virginia National Guard Management Group, in conjunction with the Virginia National Guard Association and the Virginia Army / Air National Guard Enlisted Association, have rescheduled the event because of public health and safety concerns due to the Coronavirus pandemic.



"As we have an additional five months to prepare, we are committed to ensuring every effort to deliver a highly successful annual conference," said Maj. Gen. (Ret.) John D. Taylor, VNGMG chair and president. "We'll enhance the program to be more dynamic and innovative featuring key themes around the everchanging life of Soldiers and Airmen serving in the Virginia National Guard."

The highly anticipated conference brings together over 400 leaders of the Virginia Army and Air National Guard to vote on legislative priorities, share information, and celebrate the camaraderie of membership in the oldest Military Force in the United States: the Virginia National Guard!

The conference is a four-day event packed with keynote speakers, special events and access to one



of the largest defense industry trade shows in Virginia. We will have exhibits, opportunities for learning, and informational presentations. In addition, the committee is working on a **special surprise**.

For planning purposes, the next Conference dates are 11-13 March 2022, in Richmond


Commonwealth Prayer Breakfast, 13 January 2021



Do You Have National Guard License Plates?



Enlisted members receive a numbered plate which stays the same for the member's entire career. Officers and warrant officers receive a numbered plate, based on their relative rank in the officer corps.



Retirees receive plates based on a numbered and lettered sequence. Retirees retain the same plates for life. Retirees may pay \$10/annually for a personalized plate.

National Guard Vehicle Tags

Why should I get National Guard license plates?

- To show pride of association.
- To save a little money.

National Guard and National Guard Retiree plates actually cost less than regular plates.

Retirees (all ranks) and currentlyserving enlisted personnel require "The AG of VA Form 66" to get a Virginia National Guard license plate. **Unit** readiness or administrative personnel provide this.

Retirees must provide the vehicle's registration along with a copy of their retirement letter to the TAG's office before receiving the Form 66. Each retiree or service member may get plates for no more than two vehicles registered in his/her name (either alone or jointly).

Officers and warrant officers (currently serving) must complete **VSA Form 10** and **VSA Form 14**. All Officer applications are required to process through the Adjutant General's office with documents and a copy of the



Virginia Defense Force (VDF) members may obtain VDF plates from the DMV with a VDF Form 9 signed by Division HQ. This plate has a \$10 annual charge, and optionally an additional \$10 for personalization.

registration. Officers and warrant officers receive a numbered plate, based on their rank and seniority in the officer corps. They must re-apply each time vehicle registration comes due, in order to get new plate numbers based on their new relative ranking.

Field grade officers may pay \$10/annually to apply for two-digit plates. Only general officers may apply for one-digit plates.
